
Francis Bacon: Revelations

A conversation about the first comprehensive biography of Francis Bacon to appear in twenty-five years

Tuesday 15 June at 19h30 on Zoom

Join Mark Stevens and Annalyn Swan, the Pulitzer Prizewinning authors of *De Kooning: An American Master*, to discuss their latest book, *Francis Bacon: Revelations*. Stevens and Swan will be in conversation with bestselling author and journalist Elaine Sciolino. Written with the full cooperation of the Bacon estate, unrivalled access to the archives, and based on hundreds of interviews and extensive new material from Ireland, Tangier, Spain, England and France, this definitive biography presents a startlingly original portrait—rich, complex, and subtle—of a commanding modern figure.




Programs for Adults

All programs, including book groups, workshops, and *Evenings with an Author* sponsored by GRoW @ Annenberg, will continue virtually for the present time.




The Political Rise of George Washington

Tuesday 8 June at 19h30

Join bestselling writers David O. Stewart and Walter Stahr to discuss *George Washington: The Political Rise of America's Founding Father*. Stewart's most recent book follows the surprising transformation of a headstrong, unwise young Virginian into a master politician who led the founding of the world's first constitutional republic. The story traces Washington's political education through the Virginia House of Burgesses and Fairfax County Court to the pinnacle of American life.


His Place at the Table

A Tribute to James Baldwin

Thursday 17 June at 19h30

In honor of Juneteenth (the holiday on 19 June celebrating the end of slavery in the US) the Library is proud to cosponsor an online event with the the Mechanics' Institute on the life and work of James Baldwin. Baldwin's personal life and literary legacy will be explored through his diverse lifelong friendships and muses, his front-line political activism, and his cross-cultural connections and influences while living in Paris. This up-close-and-intimate conversation includes British writer and former editor of the *Times Literary Supplement* James Campbell, Brooklyn-based writer Clifford Thompson, and Bay Area writer and playwright Jewelle Gomez.


An Evening with Paula Deitz

Story Hour: Pirates Ahoy (virtual)


Fantasy Book Club: The Gilded Ones (virtual)
