#### Art and the art of acting at the Library

The 19th century French-Dutch impressionist Camille Pissarro, while heralded by so many for his rich, beautiful tableaux, nonetheless has not been a fixture in popular culture in the



way that those he influenced have become - artists like Cezanne, Seurat, Van Gogh and Gauguin.

On <u>22 May</u>, **Ann Saul**, a veritable Pissarro scholar, writer and art lecturer, will take us on a journey through the evocative paintings of this master, an evening that promises to be fascinating art lovers and those who simply love to see France depicted on canvas. # **Art on View: Homage to Daniel Buren** by Serene Wise

Tuesday 21 May to Sunday 7 July



This <u>exhibition</u> presents paintings, maquettes and drawings by Serene Wise from her series, *Homage to Daniel Buren*, which began during the artist's 2011 residency at the Cité Internationale des Arts in Paris. Daniel Buren is famous for painting vertical bands or stripes always at 8.7 centimeters wide – the width of stripes used in commercial awning material in France – and always oriented at 90°, making them straight up and down.



With a sense of play, Wise began her homage to Buren with his 8.7 centimeter bands which, after much experimentation, she placed at 78°. She felt that this 78° angle worked well with the 8.7

centimeter bands. The numbers are a nice juxtaposition: 8.7 centimeters @ 78°.

You can hear the artist talk more about Daniel Buren and the inspirations behind her artwork when she speaks on Saturday <u>8 June</u> at 14h00 at the Library.
