

Coups de Cœur: American Library in Paris Book Award

Five exceptional new books about France have been selected as "coups de cœur" in the runup to the 14 January announcement of the 2020 American Library in Paris Book Award winner. The coups de cœur were selected from the seventy-seven submissions by the award's screening committee as having special merit. They are available for checkout at the Library.



The Art of Resistance, an extraordinary wartime memoir of a young French resistant during Nazi occupation, Justus Rosenberg, now an American citizen of 99.

Becoming Beauvoir, a commanding portrait of France's leading woman of ideas by British philosopher Kate Kirkpatrick.


The Loneliest Band in France, a perceptive novella narrated by a Sri Lankan student in Toulouse, swept up in the musical and drinking scene, by Dylan Fisher.

A New World Begins, a rich new history of the French revolution by American historian Jeremy D. Popkin.

The Seine, a passionate exploration, in time and space, of the great French river by Paris writer Elaine Sciolino.



All programs, including book groups, workshops, and *Evenings with an Author* sponsored by GRoW @ Annenberg, will continue virtually for the present time.




Evenings with an Author: Dr. Maurice Samuels

Join us for a book talk on *The Betrayal of the Duchess: The Scandal that Unmade the Bourbon Monarchy and Made France Modern.* The year was 1832, the French royal family was in exile, and the Duchesse de Berry—the mother of the eleven-year-old heir to the throne—hatched a plot to restore the Bourbon dynasty. Her betrayal by her trusted advisor, the son of France's Chief Rabbi, became a cause célèbre for Bourbon loyalists and ignited a firestorm of hate against France's Jews.




Evenings with an Author: Kristen Richardson Wednesday 9 December at 19h30 via Zoom

Rachel Mesch is the author of *Before Trans: Three Gender Stories from Nineteenth-Century France*, which is shortlisted for the upcoming American Library in Paris Book Award.
